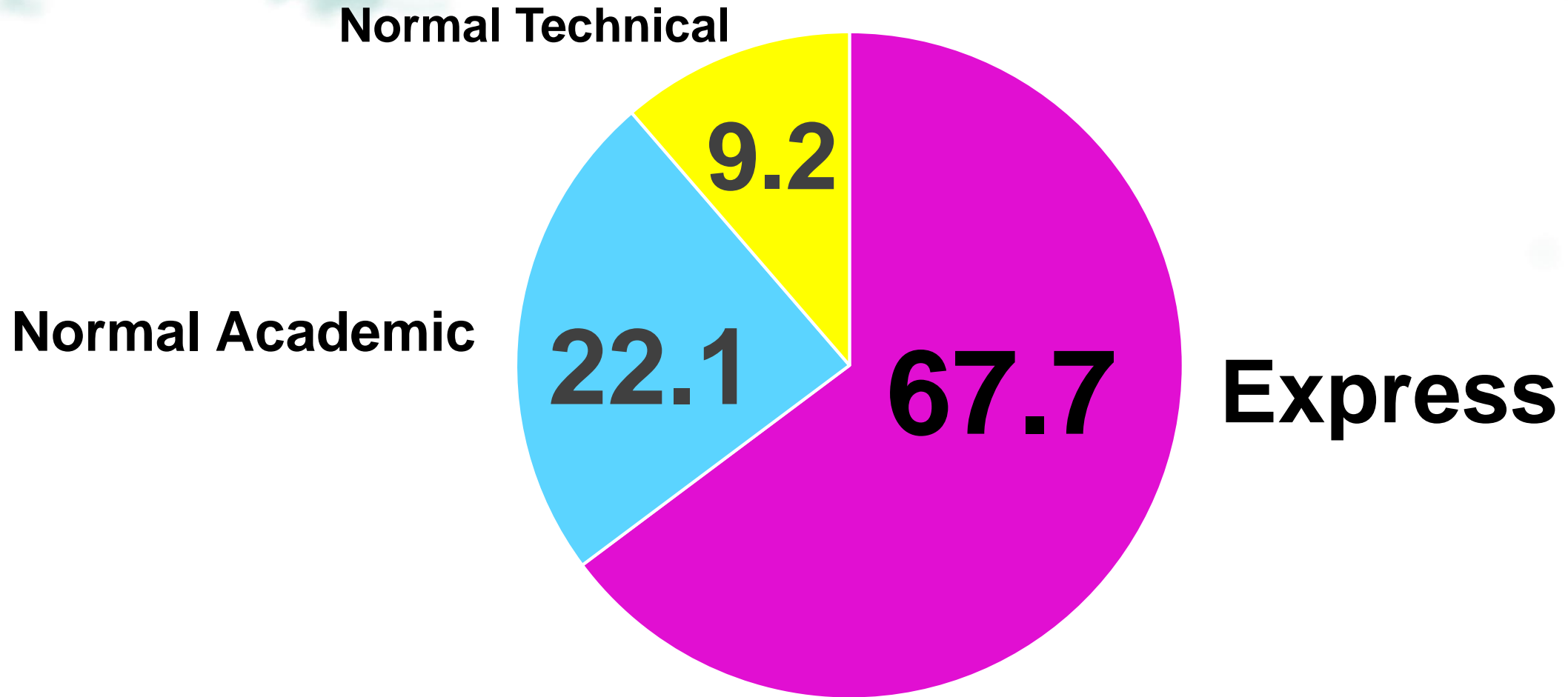

FROM T-SCORE TO SCORING BANDS

- From 2021, your child's score will not be benchmarked against their peers.
- Their marks will be converted according to the new scoring bands of Achievement Level (AL) 1 – AL 8
- Their PSLE score will be the sum of the four subjects. It ranges from 4 to 32, with 4 being the best possible total score.

1	≥ 90
2	85 – 89
3	80 – 84
4	75 – 79

For the purpose of Secondary 1 posting, Foundation level **AL A to AL C** will be mapped to **AL 6 to AL 8** of Standard level subjects respectively, to derive a student's overall PSLE Score.

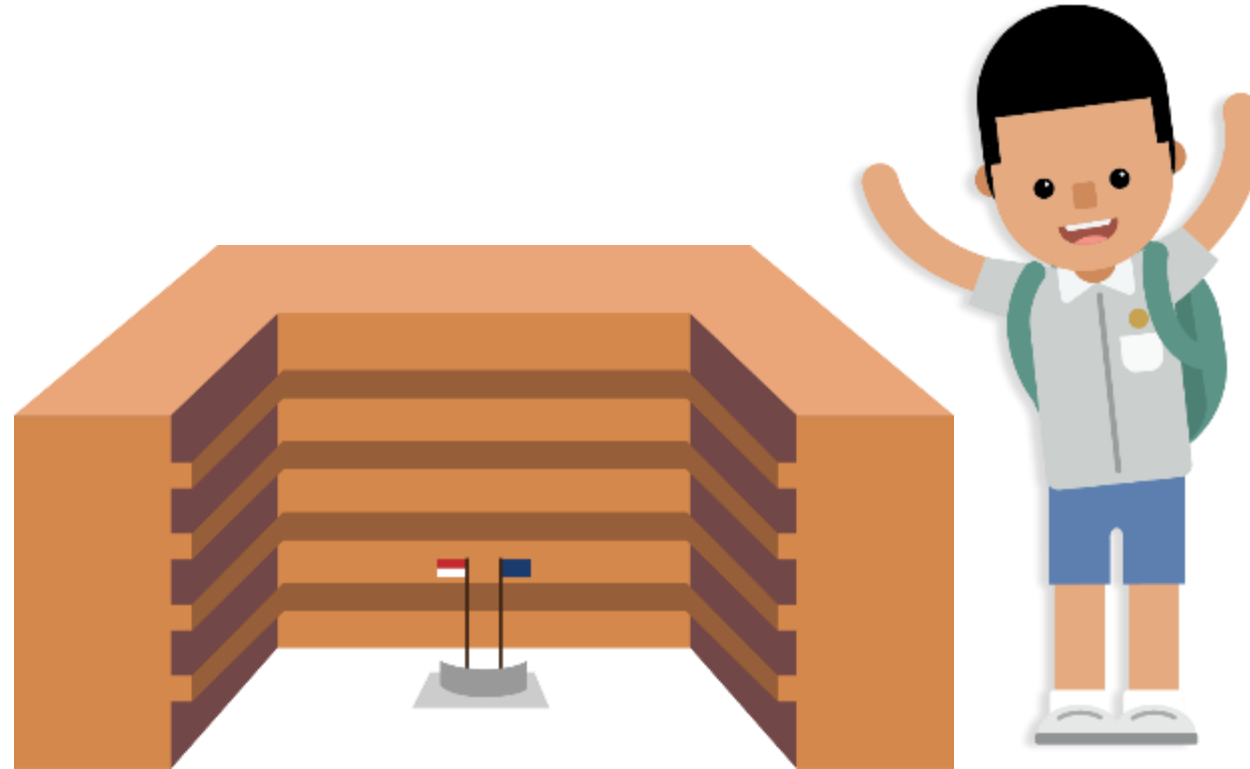

HOW THE S1 POSTING SYSTEM WORKS



CHOICE ORDER Of schools matters more

Students continue to have six choices in selecting their secondary schools.

Similar to past years, students continue to be posted to a secondary school based on academic merit, i.e., PSLE Score, and their school choice order.

If there are two or more students with the same PSLE Score vying for the last remaining place(s) in a school, the following tie-breakers will be used in the following order:

1. CITIZENSHIP
 2. CHOICE ORDER OF SCHOOLS (New tie-breaker from 2021 onwards)
 3. COMPUTERISED BALLOTING
- The new tie-breaker based on school choice order recognises the different considerations that families have in making school choices.



Tie-breakers

in the new S1 Posting System


Tie-breakers are used only if there are two or more students with the same PSLE Score vying for the last available place(s) in a school.

Here's a simplified example.

5 students are vying for the last places in the schools of their choice.

➤ Students with better scores will be posted first

Jane has a better PSLE score. She will be posted first, to **School A**.



Bryan, Mary, Alan and Rina have the same score.

As Jane has taken the last available place in School A, Bryan, Mary, Alan and Rina will vie for the last available place in their next choice, **School B**.

➤ Tie-breaker #1: Citizenship

Bryan and Mary are Singapore Citizens. They will have priority to enter **School B**.



Alan and Rina will be tie-broken out as they are Permanent Residents. They will be considered for their next choice, **School D**.

➤ Tie-breaker #2: Choice order of schools

Because Bryan ranked School B higher than Mary, he will be posted to **School B**.



Since Bryan has taken the last place in School B, Mary will be posted to **School C**.



Alan and Rina have both ranked School D as their third choice. They will go through computerised balloting to vie for the last remaining place in **School D**.

➤ Tie-breaker #3: Computerised balloting

Through computerised balloting, Alan is posted to **School D**.



Since Alan has taken the last place in School D, Rina will be posted to her fourth choice, **School E**.



PSLE SCORE RANGES FOR INDIVIDUAL SECONDARY SCHOOLS



PSLE SCORE RANGES FOR INDIVIDUAL SECONDARY SCHOOLS

The PSLE Score range refers to the PSLE Score of the first and last student admitted to a particular school in the previous year via the S1 Posting Exercise. This shows the range of student profiles who enter each school.

Example

USE OF HIGHER CHINESE LANGUAGE (HCL) FOR ADMISSION INTO SPECIAL ASSISTANCE PLAN (SAP) SCHOOLS



HCL POSTING ADVANTAGE FOR ENTRY TO SAP SCHOOLS WILL CONTINUE

Students who obtained a Distinction/Merit/Pass for HCL at the PSLE and an overall PSLE Score of 14 or better will receive a posting advantage when applying to SAP schools.

Students will be considered for admission to SAP schools in the following order:



1st

Students with better PSLE Scores will be posted first, even if they did not take HCL

Amongst students with the same PSLE Score, those with better HCL grades will be posted first

DISTINCTION

- Students' HCL results are denoted as 'D' (Distinction), 'M' (Merit) or 'P' (Pass).
- Students who obtain (i) a Distinction / Merit / Pass in HCL and (ii) a PSLE Score of 14 or better are eligible for posting advantage to SAP schools.
- Students are ranked taking into account their performance in HCL.
- This posting advantage applies before the tie-breakers for S1 Posting.

EXAMPLE OF AN SAP SCHOOL'S PSLE SCORE RANGE

While students need not take HCL to enter SAP schools, students who pass HCL receive a posting advantage for admission. To reflect this, the PSLE Score ranges of SAP schools include the HCL grades of the first and last student admitted in the previous year via S1 Posting.

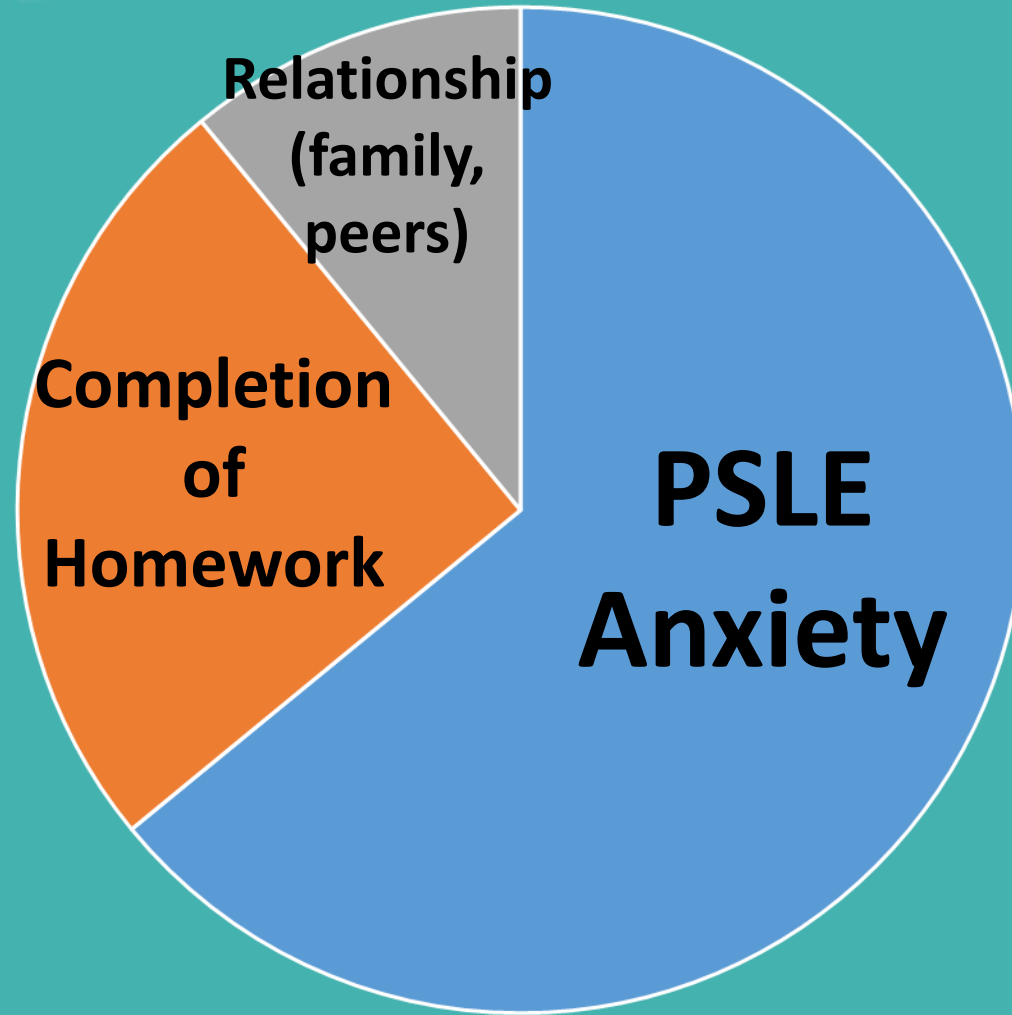

What is the school doing to alleviate the students' concerns?

1. PSLE Anxiety: (Equipping students with skills to cope)

- Resilience Package (beginning of the year)
- Motivational Camp
- FTGP 1-1 Interaction: channel for students to talk to their FT
- School taps on the expertise of the Senior School Counsellor to address students' emotional needs and provide psychological care





What is the school doing to alleviate the students' concerns?

2. Completion of Homework

- Too many commitments outside school?
- Allowance for them to submit their homework (e.g. students who were absent from school due to vaccination or CCA)





What is the school doing to alleviate the students' concerns?

3. Relationship (Family – Parents and Siblings/ Friendship)

- Social Skills Packages
- Peer Support Relationship
- Cyber-wellness Packages
- Sexuality Talk



Recognising and Talking about Stress

4 Tips to check in with your child about school



Children may not always voice out their fears or anxieties on their own. Make it a point to have regular conversations about what's going on in school and in their life, and make sure it's not just about their grades!

This will make it easier for them to open up when they are facing difficulties, and for you to pick up on what's troubling them.

Recognising and Talking about Stress

Tip 1: Ask open-ended questions

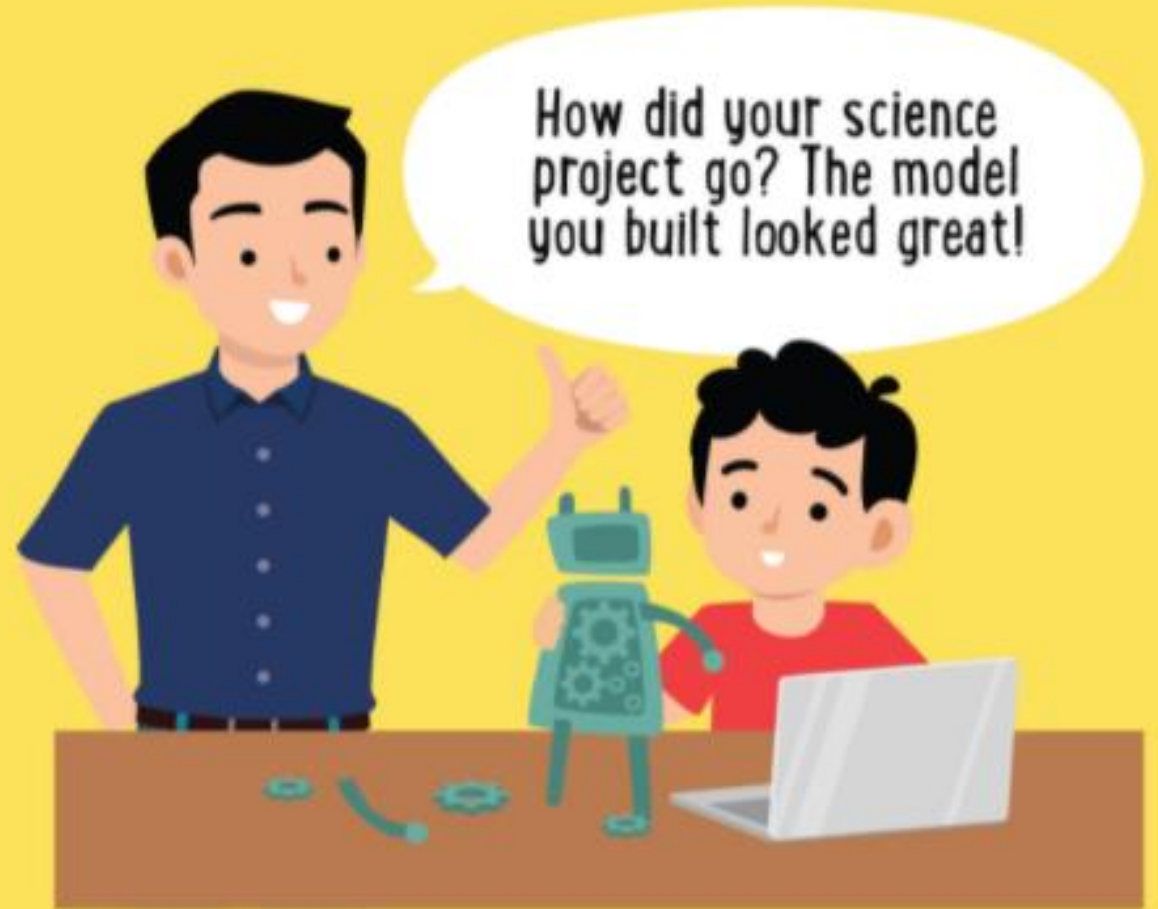
Compared to 'Yes or no' questions, these can encourage your child to share more. If they are quiet, offer options.



Recognising and Talking about Stress

Tip 2: Follow your child's interest

Talk to them about things that get them excited or chat about a school activity they mentioned. This shows you are interested in what they care about.



Recognising and Talking about Stress

Tip 3: Problem-solve together

It's tempting to offer solutions right away when your child shares his problems. Instead, listen and ask them to think about how they will address the situation and guide them towards their own solutions.



Recognising and Talking about Stress

Tip 4: Be a role model

Share your own thoughts to show it's ok to talk about one's emotions and worries. Explain how you deal with your problems, and encourage your child to find ways that work for them.

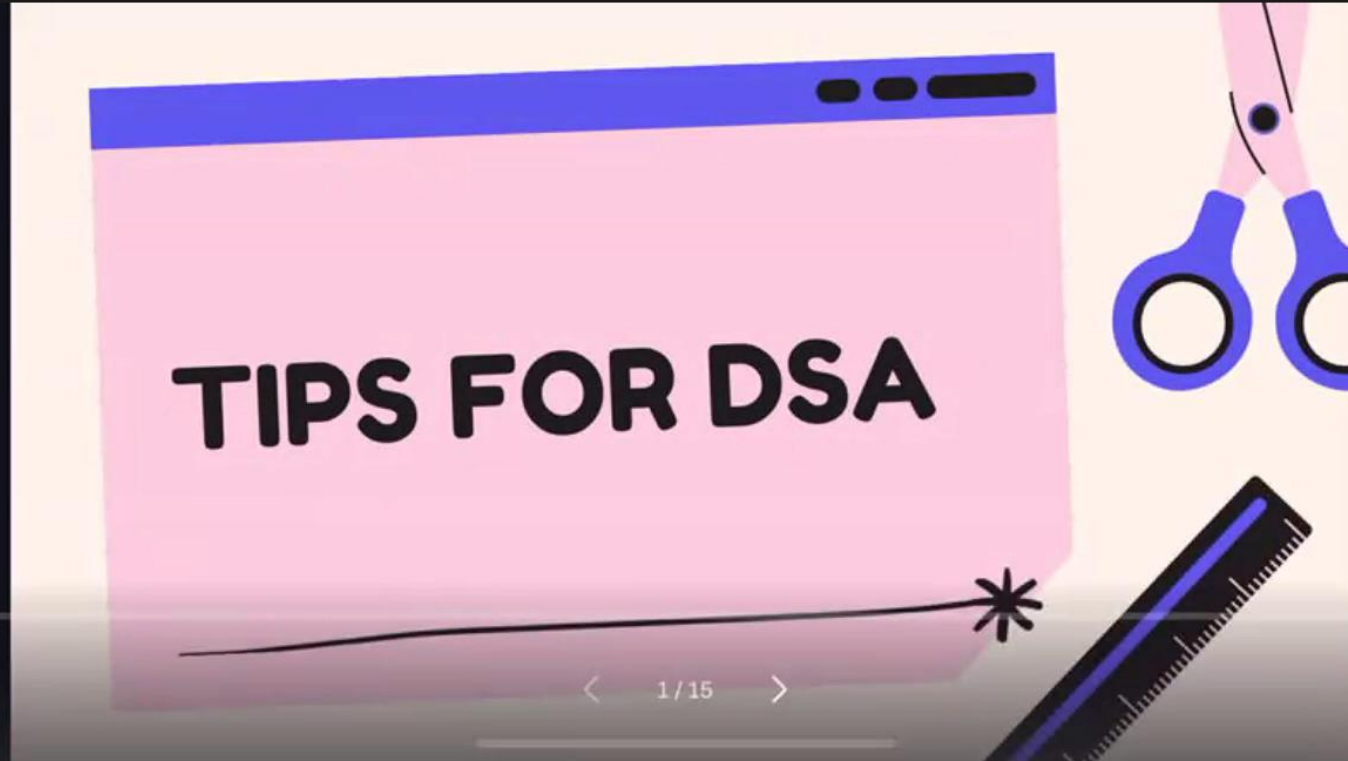

Entering a secondary school



PSLE/S1 Posting Process

- Based on a student's **PSLE score**
- **Most students enter secondary schools this way**



DSA-Sec

- Based on a diverse range of **talents and achievements in specific academic subjects or non-academic areas, beyond what the PSLE recognises**
- Allows students to **access school programmes to develop their talents**

Overview of DSA

Direct School Admission for secondary schools (DSA-Sec) allows students to **gain direct entry** to certain secondary schools **based on their talent** in sports, CCAs and specific academic areas.

Eligibility

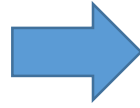
Primary 6 students can apply for DSA-Sec based on a **wide-range of talents**, including:

- Sports and games
- Visual, literary and performing arts
- Debate and public speaking
- Science, mathematics and engineering
- Languages and humanities
- Uniformed groups
- Leadership (for example, prefects)

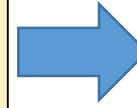
April

Explore the list of schools that offer DSA and their programmes



May to June

Apply for the preferred schools through the DSA-Sec portal



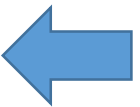
July to August

Shortlisted students to attend interviews, auditions or trials



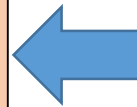
End November

Admission will only be confirmed when the PSLE results are released



End October

Selected students to submit their school preferences through the DSA-Sec Portal



Mid September

Selected students will receive offers from the schools directly
